Bachelor of Arts pathway semester at Ipswich

At the Ipswich campus you will enrol in the first semester of the Bachelor of Arts degree. On successful completion of your first semester (four courses) at Ipswich you will then transfer to the wide range of study areas available in the Bachelor of Arts program at the St Lucia campus.

Please note that there are no Arts courses offered in the second semester at the Ipswich campus.

Program outline

A Bachelor of Arts degree gives you a better understanding of how human beings make, recognise, and argue about life's meaning and the values that support civilisation. The BA offers a wide choice of academic subject areas in the core disciplines of humanities and social sciences. Students tailor the degree to suit their own career aspirations - there are many majors from which to choose. Students undertake two single majors, or a more concentrated extended major and a minor, plus a range of electives.

A BA graduate is someone who has gained skills and knowledge, not just in a subject area but also in written communication, critical thinking, and problem solving and can apply these skills in many different jobs, careers and life situations.

Career opportunities

The study of humanities and the social sciences is recognised worldwide as producing graduates with strong written and verbal communication skills, and the ability to apply creative problem-solving abilities to all areas of business, industry and education. Get the health career you want with the Bachelor of Health Sciences.

This program provides the skills for a career in non-clinical healthcare and provides the foundations to undertake a clinical program such as Medicine or Physiotherapy. It provides a comprehensive overview of preventive health and the healthcare system.

The Bachelor of Health Sciences has been developed to graduate non-clinical healthcare professionals who focus on preventing illness and disease throughout the population and who have skills in the assessment, management, planning and delivery of efficient quality healthcare.

Students will study a wide range of subject areas including the biomedical sciences (eg. anatomy and physiology), preventive health (health promotion, physical activity, nutrition, population health and health behaviour change), the business of health (eg. health systems and health management) and professional practice (eg. health law and ethics). In addition, all students undertake a one-semester work placement prior to graduation.

For students wishing to enhance their career opportunities, dual program options and professional masters degrees are available. The Bachelor of Health Sciences/Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery dual program is one of the preferred pathways into a medical career as it combines preventive health with clinical medicine. For students seeking an allied health career, the Bachelor of Health Sciences is an excellent preclinical degree prior to enrolment in a masters program in disciplines such as physiotherapy, speech pathology, dietetics or occupational therapy.

Majors

Nutrition

This major studies the way foods and nutrients are acquired and used. It encompasses biomedical science, biochemistry, nutrition, behavioural sciences and supporting studies in health systems, public health and Indigenous health. Graduates can work as community nutritionists or go on to undertake the Master of Dietetics Studies and become accredited practicing dietitians.

Health Promotion and Population Health

This major has a focus on preventive health within the community. It examines how preventive health programs are planned and delivered to improve health outcomes across communities rather than individuals.

Indigenous Health

With a focus on illness and disease prevention, this major equips graduates to develop, plan, deliver and assess public health programs/services for Indigenous populations.

Health Services Management

This major examines the management and operation of health programs/services and health information systems. Specifically, the major explores the financial and human resource aspects of service provision within a hospital or health community centre, including establishing, maintaining and evaluating health programs and developing information technology initiatives such as e-health.

Work placement

In third-year, all students have the opportunity to put theory into practice during workplace field placements within the health industry. Students work in the community, gaining hands-on experience in their area of interest to ensure they are job ready upon graduation.

Dual programs

For students who gain entry into the MBBS provisional entry sub-quota, the Bachelor of Health Sciences/Bachelor of Medicine/Surgery six-year dual degree is available. Dual degrees are an attractive option for potential medical students as they reduce by 12 months the standard academic pathway to graduate as a medical practitioner (see to page 13 for further information).

International students must undertake this program on campus at UQ on a full-time basis to be eligible to apply for an Australian student visa.

Honours

A graduate entry (one additional year of study) honours option offers suitable students a gateway to a rewarding research career, investigating health's most pressing challenges.

What is Human Services?

The Bachelor of Human Services degree provides a pathway into a wide range of employment opportunities in fields such as:

- child and family welfare, including child protection
- mental health
- disability services
- the corrections and justice system
- youth services
- services to the older population
- community development
- housing and homelessness services
- women's services
- counselling and personal support
- employment and income security
- working with refugees and immigrants
- working with Indigenous communities.

In all of these areas, there are a wide range of employment opportunities for human service workers who have the knowledge and skills that you will learn in the human services program. These are challenging and rewarding jobs for people who want careers that involve working with people and addressing important social issues.

What will I study?

The program covers the knowledge and skills required to work in a wide range of positions in the fields listed above. The program begins in first-year with foundation knowledge courses drawn from key disciplines that focus on people and society such as psychology, sociology and political science. Foundation courses also introduce students to the human services industry and the ethical and legal issues involved in human services work. In second-year, courses cover the main areas of human services practice and skills. These include casework and interpersonal skills; working with groups and teams; working with communities (including community education); working in organisations (including human services management); and participating in social policy. In third-year, students specialise in the areas of human services in which they have a particular interest such as child protection, working with young people, or working in the disability field.

Learning in the workplace

An attractive feature of the Bachelor of Human Services is that students have the opportunity to 'learn through doing'. In the second and third years of the program, students are assigned to organisations where they learn from experienced professionals about working in human services. Often these workplace experiences lead directly to employment opportunities after graduation. Most students really enjoy 'on-the-job' learning alongside their university studies.

Career opportunities

The human services industry is growing rapidly and employment prospects are excellent. Human services graduates work in government departments such as Disability Services Queensland and the Department of Child Safety, and in community and church-based organisations. There are opportunities for work in both Australia and overseas.

The professional titles of human service workers are extremely varied. Examples include:

- youth development officer
- youth worker
- child safety support officer
- outreach worker
- community development officer
- program coordinator
- case worker
- case manager
- project officer.

The program is designed to meet the accreditation guidelines of the Australian Institute of Community and Welfare Workers Inc.

Human services graduates can become fully qualified social workers after a further 18 months of study in UQ's Master of Social Work Studies. Graduates will also be guaranteed entry to UQ's Graduate Diploma in Education (Middle Years of Schooling) enabling them to become a qualified teacher with one year of further study. They can also do an honours year (forth year) to prepare themselves for research roles in the human services industry.

The Bachelor of Health Sciences has been recognised by the School of Medicine as a preferred pathway into medicine as it provides students with an excellent foundation in health for their medical careers. It is available only to students who have gained entry into the Year 12 provisional entry quota for medicine and reduces the time to graduate with a medical degree by 12 months.

This program produces highly skilled doctors capable of meeting future challenges in a wide variety of careers. The curriculum has been designed with an emphasis on problem-based learning and group work. Students work cooperatively on a carefully planned series of patient-centred problems, each designed to highlight principles and issues in health and disease. Early patient contact and clinical training develop high levels of clinical skills and medical knowledge. The MBBS at Ipswich offers clinical exposure from first year, an enhanced clinical studies program and small group learning.

This dual degree combines training in preventive health and health management, with clinical medical studies. This dynamic new combination of degrees produces highly skilled medical graduates with a broader knowledge of disease prevention and a deeper understanding of the healthcare system.

Graduates will be eligible to apply for registration as both a nurse and a midwife through the Queensland Nursing Council.
