Ohm, who is also the President of UQ's Thailand Alumni Association, works for the Department of International Economic Affairs within Thailand's Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The Department aims to further Thai trade interests with other countries and regional trade groups such as the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation.

Ohm's duties include organising and attending events and liaising with Thai Embassies, ministries, departments and Consulate Generals around the world.

"I'm a career diplomat and my job is to make friends for my country and represent my country – to do anything to foster relations with other nations," he said.

"I enjoy meeting different people and learning more about different cultures."

Ohm has hosted United Nations Secretary-General Kofi Annan and helped organise the visit of 25 of the world's royal families to Thailand for the Thai King's 60th anniversary.

He said he had learnt diplomatic and negotiation skills as well as many cultural intricacies.

Ohm graduated from UQ's Master of International Relations and Asian Politics in 2003.

It took five months of exams and interviews before he was accepted into Foreign Affairs.

Ohm said he had always wanted to work in foreign affairs.

"We had a lot of workshops and discussions at UQ that really helped me broaden my mind to learn how other people think," he said.

In his role as President of UQ's Thailand Alumni Association, Ohm said he was planning more social activities for other Thai graduates, which would open up networking and business opportunities.

Program outline

Whatever your field of interest, from linguistics to philosophy, postgraduate study in Arts broadens the mind and helps you to branch out in the direction you want to grow. Students can begin with a single course, and work their

way right up to a masters. Students obtain analytical and research skills valuable within professional environments, and can gain entry to the MPhil or PhD research programs. This is a coursework program which offers graduates of any discipline the opportunity to study in the following areas in the humanities: Ancient History, Applied Linguistics, Australian Studies, Ethics, History, Humanities, Linguistics, Philosophy, Shakespeare Studies, Studies in Religion, TESOL Studies, Writing, Editing and Publishing. The program provides analytical and research skills which are valuable to students in all their professional activities.

Fields of study**Ancient History** (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Ancient History offers a range of courses addressing the history, literature, philosophy, art, and archaeology of ancient civilisations. The program provides technical understanding of ancient sources (written, archaeological, iconographic, etc) and analytical reasoning skills. Students critically assess modern scholarly views and develop advanced oral and written communication skills. Courses include the civilisations of ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia; the literature, philosophy, political history, and the art, architecture, and culture of ancient Greece and Rome.

Applied Linguistics (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Students are provided with a professional development program with a special focus on languages other than English (LOTE). Core courses cover Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) teaching and curriculum, computer-enhanced language learning, and language structure. Electives explore the linguistic, psychological, educational and socio-cultural aspects of language learning, and the methodology of teaching and learning English in second and foreign language settings. Research and project options are also available, and are recommended for those intending to continue to higher research degrees.

Applied and Local History (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma*)

The field of Applied and Local History is designed to provide students with a broad understanding of heritage, applied history and family and community history. Courses combine training in research methods, history of heritage and built environment, applied history, and family and local history, along with specialist projects dedicated to particular student interests.

Australian Studies (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Australian Studies encompasses a range of disciplines including literary studies, cultural studies, history, politics, and sociology, and considers contemporary social debates and their historical contexts. Australia's cultural development in areas such as Indigenous culture and politics, immigration and multiculturalism, gender and sexuality, art, literature, and popular culture can also be studied. Students develop a detailed and critical knowledge of Australia by exploring significant issues in Australian history and contemporary cultures, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies.

Ethics (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Ethics programs are suitable for students with little or no undergraduate background in the discipline. Students can tailor their study to acquire a general understanding of ethics, or to develop knowledge in a particular area of interest. Graduates possess an enriched social, cultural and historical understanding of the source and nature of contemporary ethical problems; an appreciation of philosophical

issues raised by ethical dilemmas; an understanding of ethical and social problems associated with technological developments; an understanding of the multidisciplinary character of contemporary ethical issues; enhanced precision and clarity in communication skills; and the capacity to analyse complex problems carefully and critically.

History (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Students have the opportunity to examine in depth the history of America, Asia, Australia, Europe, and the Pacific. History teaches students to interrogate the past and to enter into dialogue with forces that have shaped the world. Areas of study include social change, international affairs, warfare, gender, race relations, crime, popular culture, and sexuality.

Humanities (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Students have the benefit of creating their own multi-disciplinary programs by drawing on postgraduate courses offered by the Faculty. Students can combine courses in history, philosophy, Shakespeare studies, or writing, editing and publishing, to complete a program that meets individual needs. Study plans are to be approved by the Director of Studies.

Japanese (*Graduate Diploma*)

Students must have high levels of proficiency in both spoken and written Japanese and must pass aptitude tests before being accepted into this program. Typically, students will already have spent time studying or working in the country of their second language. The program aim is to impart interpreting and translating skills, rather than language skills. Consequently, a high level of linguistic skills is assumed prior to entry and no specific training is available in language acquisition.

Linguistics (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master, Master (Advanced)*)

Students examine key theories and issues about language. This major is designed to provide access to the field for postgraduates with no (or minimal) undergraduate linguistic training, and also provides a formal qualification for practising field-linguists who wish to improve their theoretical knowledge.

Philosophy (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

This program provides a thorough grounding in the problems, methods and history of philosophy. Students may develop a general knowledge of philosophy or pursue specific interests, and can tailor the program to meet their individual needs.

Shakespeare Studies

Shakespeare studies provides students with a comprehensive investigation into Shakespeare's works, their historical, social, and political contexts, and a range of discourses and theatre practices relevant to their contemporary reading and performance. Courses are available in Renaissance drama texts, performance, dramatic and critical theory, and research methods. Students also have the opportunity to be involved in a practical secondment with a theatre company.

Studies in Religion (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

This field broadens students' knowledge and understanding of modern theology and religion. Courses explore major world religions, both eastern and western, as well as indigenous belief systems and new religious movements. The aim of studies in religion is to encourage an understanding of the phenomenon of religion by applying methods developed by historians, philosophers, psychologists, sociologists and linguists.

TESOL Studies (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) is a dynamic, global profession. With English being the international language of business, education, and cross-cultural communication, qualified TESOL professionals are in great demand worldwide. The TESOL Program is a professional development program for experienced teachers of English as a Foreign Language (EFL) and English as a Second Language (ESL). At least one year of teaching experience in a language related area is required for entry. The program provides thorough grounding in TESOL theory and practice through coursework in the linguistic, psychological, educational and socio-cultural aspects of language learning, and in the methodology of teaching and learning English in second and foreign language settings. Core courses cover TESOL teaching and curriculum, computer-enhanced language learning, language structure, and a range of electives in language teaching and learning. Research and project options are also available, particularly for students intending to continue on to higher research degrees.

Writing, Editing and Publishing (*Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma, Master*)

The explosion of text-creating and publishing opportunities in the contemporary workplace has created a growing demand for writing and editing expertise. Students hone their writing, editing, and designing skills, and enhance their career path in today's communication-intensive world. The suite of programs, including a Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma and Masters, offers the opportunity for sustained academic research, argument and presentation, as well as the acquisition of in-depth knowledge, effective communication skills, and critical judgement. *The Graduate Certificate in Arts in Writing, Editing and Publishing is only available full-time in semester two and therefore international students can only commence this field in semester two.*

Career opportunities

The Faculty of Arts offers postgraduate coursework programs that enable students to upgrade their skills and professional development needs for employment in a wide range of disciplines. Graduates of this program receive a qualification that will enhance their employment opportunities in all areas of the public service and private enterprise. In the face of unprecedented change and uncertainty at both a local and global level, organisations are seeking graduates who can think critically and react positively to these changes. Coursework Master

Duration 2 years full-time

Admission requirements Bachelor degree in any field or equivalent with a grade point average of 4.5 on a 7 point scale OR a Graduate Certificate or Graduate Diploma in the relevant field. Proficiency in spoken and written Japanese and English. Work experience is desirable but not essential. Applicants sit an aptitude test set by the School of Languages and Comparative Cultural Studies before being admitted to the program. A fee applies for the MAJIT aptitude test. Program outline

This is a professional program providing training for students with very high levels of competence in the Japanese and English languages as translators and conference interpreters. It covers four broad, interlinked areas of study: theoretical and practical training in interpreting techniques; theoretical and practical training in translation techniques; training in ancillary skills such as public speaking and job-specific research; and training in professional areas such as ethics and business skills.

Career opportunities

The program trains graduates for work as conference interpreters and/or translators. It is anticipated that graduates of the program will gain employment as interpreters and/or translators or else upgrade their language skills to a level where they can be used in the practice of another profession.

Professional memberships

Graduates of this degree may be eligible for membership with: National Accreditation Authority for Translators and Interpreters at Conference Interpreter and Advanced Translator level (formerly NAATI Level 4) (the only program in Australia accredited at this level).

Coursework Master

Program outline

Arts in Translation and Interpreting (English and Chinese) is a suite of programs including a Graduate Certificate, Graduate Diploma and Masters qualification, designed to develop students' practical techniques and skills of translation between English and Chinese and interpreting between English and Mandarin. It seeks to help them obtain an understanding of theories and professional aspects of translation and interpreting and to apply them in translation and interpreting practice. Emphasis will be placed on professional translation and interpreting. Students who complete the Masters program will be qualified up to the first professional level specified by NAATI (formerly known as level 3). They will be trained in different areas including society, business and trade, law, science and technology, politics and international relations, and will be expected to satisfactorily perform as professionals in related translation and interpreting situations. Apart from translation and interpreting techniques and skills, students are expected to learn theories that underpin translation and interpreting practice, develop a solid understanding of the code of ethics in translation and interpreting, and acquire cultural and social knowledge relevant to the countries where English and Chinese are spoken. This program is not a language program as such, but a specialised program in training in translation and interpreting skills and related content areas, taught upon a basis of bilingualism which students bring with them to the program.

Placement courses

Students are required to do 120 hours of field practice in translation and interpreting, which has been set to meet the NAATI guidelines. This field practice is designed to introduce and involve students in active translation and interpreting tasks within specific field settings and under the supervision of the program convenor, experienced translators/interpreters or a mentor assigned by the program convenor. Whilst the overall purpose of the practicum is to ensure that students have maximum opportunity to be active in translation/interpreting tasks, other learning activities related to the general work context of translation/interpreting eg attending interdisciplinary meetings, conferences, an agency visit and interpreter assisted court proceedings will be facilitated wherever and whenever possible. Students are placed in various government and community organisations and companies around Brisbane. If students are not able to go on placement due to family or other reasons they are provided with simulated practice on campus by the course coordinator.

Career opportunities

It is anticipated that graduates of the program will gain employment as interpreters and/or translators.

Professional memberships

Graduates may be eligible for NAATI accreditation at the first Professional level (formerly NAATI level 3).

Coursework Master

Duration 2 years full-time. Domestic students may undertake the program on a part-time basis

Admission requirements Honours I or II in psychology or an undergraduate psychology degree approved by the Australian Psychological Society. Before applying, students with non-Australian degrees must apply to the Australian Psychological Society (<http://www.psychology.org.au/>) for assessment of their qualifications.

On acceptance of an offer students must take out probationary registration with the Psychologists Board of Queensland (<http://www.psychologyboard.qld.gov.au/>). This registration must be maintained for the duration of the program. Probationary or full registration is a prerequisite for entry to the degree, and also commencement of both coursework and applied work in the program. All applicants are required to submit a certified copy of their official transcript and/or degree certificate, three referee reports (<http://www.psy.uq.edu.au>) and complete the application form (<http://www.psy.uq.edu.au>) that seeks to ascertain students' suitability for the program. Shortlisted students are also required to undertake an in-depth interview with

staff from the School of Psychology (www.psy.uq.edu.au)

Placement courses

Students are required to complete 1000 hours of supervised practice over four semesters. Every effort is made to place students within a reasonable distance of the UQ campus but they can be expected to travel up to 60 minutes away. Students are generally placed at Ipswich, Brisbane, and the Southeast corner of Queensland. Students are required to have a current Blue Card (Working with Children Check) before starting their practice. There will be no extra costs to the student in addition to course fees except for incidentals such as travel and daily expenses. The Clinical Program Practicum Handbook provides additional information about practicum and school experience requirements and is available from the School of Psychology.

Program outline

Clinical psychologists promote optimal levels of psychological functioning to decrease levels of psychological distress. They have expertise in the assessment, diagnosis, treatment and prevention of a broad range of emotional and behavioural problems including anxiety, depression, stress, substance addiction and abuse, adjustment to physical illness, relationship difficulties and learning disabilities. This program provides knowledge and professional skills in the area of clinical psychology through a combination of coursework, supervised practice, and research. Students gain a foundation in the scientific bases and practice of clinical psychology. The training in clinical practice employs evidence-based best practice models in health and mental health settings.

Admission requirements A bachelor degree in any field or the Graduate Diploma in Communication. The field of Media Studies also requires previous study in a field related to English or Media and Science Communication requires a Science degree or a strong science background

Program outline

This program provides students with the knowledge and skills required to excel in the ever-expanding communication industries. The program is designed to enhance the skills of existing communication graduates and professionals. Courses are designed to increase understanding of the application of communication theory and research to health promotion, business, public relations, policy and politics, intercultural relations and globalisation. Students develop knowledge of communication dynamics, as well as practical professional skills.

Fields of study

Communication for Social Change (St Lucia)

This field provides a broad comparative overview of international and intercultural communication problems and perspectives in the contemporary world, with a special focus on the developing world. Students examine contending theoretical and methodological perspectives; explore the socio-cultural, economic, political, and scientific/technical role and impact of communications; analyse the interrelationships between communication and social change; and review a number of critical issues in communication research and policy making and planning at international, national, and local levels.

Health Communication (St Lucia)

This field provides a conceptual and practical basis for the development of effective communication strategies in the health field. It is relevant to students from a range of health and related disciplines. Graduates have an enhanced ability to communicate effective health messages to individuals, communities, health and other professionals, government, and the media.

Media Studies (St Lucia)

The media, in their many forms, supply much of the information used to operate in and make sense of the contemporary world. They are also central to the dissemination of information from business, government and industry. Understanding the terms on which media function is a vital skill for those working in these areas. The field provides theoretical and critical tools to help those at the interface with media organisations. Students interested in undertaking this field require previous study in media or a related field.

Organisational Communication (St Lucia)

People working in public, private, or not-for-profit organisations must communicate effectively with a wide range of staff, customers, stakeholders and various interest groups. To achieve this, they need to choose from a range of communication channels and strategies. Irrespective of background, professional skills that are required by communicators and communication managers are developed through in-depth examination and application of the theory and practice of effective organisational communication.

Public Relations and Professional Communication (St Lucia)

This field provides students with the skills

of professionally analysing communication situations and professionally designing solutions to communication problems. It also teaches the skills required to plan and implement a professional public relations campaign (including goal-setting, budgeting and evaluation); the skills of audience and public opinion analysis; a range of communication theories; and an understanding of how globalisation and the emerging information economy is impacting upon public relations practices.

Rural and Regional Communication (Gatton)

Communication with rural and regional communities is vital for a range of professionals in the agricultural and natural resource sciences, as well as health, education and other service fields. This field provides skills in 'extension', the two-way communication with communities and producers about agricultural and natural resource innovation, community development, facilitation, and empowering communication technologies.

Science Communication (St Lucia)

The effective diffusion of expert scientific knowledge is critical in today's increasingly commercialised and knowledge-intensive environment. It is intended for science graduates, or those with strong science backgrounds, who wish to communicate effectively with scientists and professionals in business, industry, government, and the media. Courses provide academic and professional development in the theory and practice of science communication. International students intending to enrol in the field of Science Communication must commence in Semester 1.

Program outline

The Master of Counselling provides graduate students with an in-depth knowledge base, and practice skills in professional counselling. This program achieves this through the encouragement of scholarship in counselling, professional skills training and attention to the recognition of the counsellor as person within counselling. The program is intended for students who desire to develop knowledge, skills and competencies for professional practice in counselling. Graduates will develop the skills to competently serve individuals, couples, families, and groups in the community. This program also promotes the professional status, identity and visibility of counsellors within our community and seeks to extend students' abilities to consider counselling within the broader social context as well as within individual client work.

Placement courses

Students are required to complete 200 hours of supervised practice over two semesters. Every effort is made to place students within a reasonable distance of the UQ campus but they can be expected to travel up to 60 minutes away and incur costs associated with travel and possible lost income over this period. Students are generally placed at Brisbane, Ipswich and the Southeast corner. Students undertake a major piece of work such as an action research project associated with one of their placements. Any costs associated with the major piece of work are negotiated with placement places and/or are the responsibility of students. Students are required to have a current Blue Card (Working with Children Check) before commencing placement. Students will apply for a Blue Card through the Field Education Unit in the School of Social Work and Applied Human Sciences if they do not already have a Blue card.

Career opportunities

The Master of Counselling provides career opportunities in human service settings such as health, welfare, community services, human resources and personnel management and private practice. It is well suited to people who work with individuals, families, groups and communities in many different fields and circumstances, such as loss and grief issues, mental health and well-being, domestic violence, sexual abuse, and drug and alcohol issues, relationship issues and others.

Program outline

The program focuses on issues associated with the planning and management of development and is aimed at those who wish to obtain a better knowledge of the dilemmas of social, political and economic development and of the means to develop solutions to these problems. The program aims to equip students with hands-on skills associated with the planning and management of development. It incorporates elements that contribute to both knowledge development (the theoretical, conceptual and comparative context) and skills development (techniques and practical applications).

Fields of study

Community Development

This field is focused on developing fundamental skills and methodologies that a professional worker requires to work face-to-face with communities. These direct practice skills and methodologies include key dimensions of practice such as micro-dialogue and communication skills, processes that sustain community livelihood, narrative community-based training processes and the development of an individualised professional practice framework that articulates the unique set of skills and attributes that a practitioner brings to his or her work.

Development Planning

This field is oriented towards planning practitioners in developing countries who wish to upgrade their qualifications to include the most recent advancements in the concepts, philosophies, theories and techniques in urban, regional and environmental planning. The program includes a research component which provides students with an opportunity to apply this knowledge to real-life planning issues and problems in their own countries. Academic staff involved in this area have extensive experience in developing countries and courses are oriented towards the needs of developing countries. Many students entering the program are sponsored by their employers who are involved in planning in developing countries. Further professional study provides openings for accelerated advancement and assumption of greater responsibility in the workplace.

International Political Development

This field is concerned with the relationship between governance and development. The increasing emphasis on democracy and 'good governance' in international development practice make this relationship central to the development agenda. Courses in this concentration focus on the capacity to implement and maintain systems of ethical governance and extent civil society through participatory programs in the context of globalisation in newly industrialising countries and developing economies. They examine strategies to address international equality, build institutional and administrative capacity, reconstruct civil society in post-conflict and development situations, enhance gender equity, and establish and maintain labour standards. These are central issues in contemporary development practice and students will gain knowledge, understanding and practical skills essential for working in this field.

Planning for Social Development

This field of study provides students with the skills and knowledge required for a career in social planning and development. The courses in this concentration area are guided by the logic and coherence of a project cycle within which students learn how to plan, design and appraise projects; conduct needs assessments; develop project proposals; assess social impacts; and engage in public consultations. They also utilise participatory rapid appraisal (PRA) techniques; design and conduct social surveys; compile community profiles; and monitor and evaluate social programs and development projects. In this way, students who graduate from this specialised area are expected to become competent social scientists and practitioners in development with both a good knowledge of the framework of social development planning, and a 'tool kit' of methodologies to apply in a variety of work settings.

Career opportunities

International organisations such as the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), World Food Program and various government departments and non-government organisations are interested in graduates with qualifications in this field.

Placement courses

Students undertaking the Graduate Diploma of Education (Middle Years of Schooling) are required to complete 55 days of supervised practicum and 15 days of internship over two semesters as well as a 5 day community placement. Students undertaking the Graduate Diploma of Education (Secondary) are required to complete 75 days of supervised practicum. This practicum is scheduled in two extended blocks (7-8 weeks) – one in each semester of the program. Every effort is made to place students within a reasonable distance of their home base but they can be expected to travel up to 90 minutes due to public transport connections and incur costs associated with travel and possible lost income over this period. Students are generally placed in Queensland's southeast region but are encouraged to explore the option of a rural placement. Rural scholarships are available to assist with travel and accommodation costs. Students are required to have a current Blue Card (Working with

Children Check) before commencing practicum. Students can apply for a Blue Card through The School of Education and should do so three months before their practicum is due to commence. The Teacher Preparation Programs Handbook provides additional information about practicum and school experience requirements and is available from the School of Education (<http://www.uq.edu.au/education/>).

Program outline

The Graduate Diploma in Education is a one-year teacher preparation program for students who already hold a tertiary degree. The program offers practical, school-based learning and draws on the latest research into effective teaching methods, ensuring graduates are well equipped to meet the challenges of a teaching career. Courses within the program will challenge participants to use their knowledge, expertise and experience to design learning environments that will engage students in the learning process and cater for a variety of learning styles. Participants learn to cooperatively and critically plan, design, implement and review relevant syllabi including developing teaching and learning strategies and curriculum materials. Graduates will have developed a personal theory of teaching that fully considers the role of teachers in the promotion of a socially just and inclusive society. This program encourages active engagement with local and global communities to promote the continuing enhancement of learning for the benefit of all.

Fields of study

Middle Years of Schooling (Ipswich)

The middle years of schooling are increasingly recognised as a crucial stage of education, with significant consequences for ongoing success and participation in future society. Teachers for these year groups require specialist preparation as they teach across key learning areas. This field enables graduates to understand and manage issues related to young adolescents. Graduates will meet the professional requirements necessary for teacher registration in Queensland, and will be able to teach Years 6-9 in both state and independent schools. Students are prepared to teach the following key learning areas: arts (including drama, dance, media and visual arts); English; mathematics; science; study of society and environment; health and physical education; and technology. The teacher education courses are interdisciplinary and issues-based. Students focus on the nature of teaching in times of rapid change. Technologically delivered and field-based projects are integrated with practice teaching and an internship.

Secondary (St Lucia)

Students are prepared for secondary school teaching, or training in business or industry. Teaching is a challenging and rewarding career, with secondary school teachers in demand worldwide. Teaching areas include English; business education (business organisation and management, accounting, legal studies, economics, hospitality management and tourism management); social education (history, geography, economics, social science); mathematical sciences; languages other than English (LOTE – Chinese, French, German, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Spanish); natural sciences (biological sciences, chemistry, physics, multistrand science, agriculture); computers and information processing; music; drama; media studies, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander studies and special education.

Career opportunities

Graduates are eligible for teacher registration in Queensland and qualified for employment as teachers in state and independent schools worldwide. An education degree opens up a vast range of career opportunities within educational settings such as Head of Department, Principal,

Guidance Officer, learning support teacher, student advisor and education advisor. The development of key competencies throughout the Graduate Diploma in Education program provides knowledge and skills sought by employers in business and industry, especially in areas where an understanding of program development and training are required.

Program outline

This program provides advanced professionally oriented studies for practising educators, focusing on the professional development needs and in-service requirements of teachers and administrators. Some pathways offer specific qualifications (eg, guidance and counselling, learning support, leadership, middle years of schooling, mathematics and science education), while others offer significant professional advantage to educators interested in career advancement or broadening career options.

Placement courses

Students studying guidance and counselling will be required to complete practicum courses that involve approximately 100 contact hours. Students studying learning support will be required to complete practicum courses that involve approximately 20 contact hours. Students may incur costs associated with the practicum (eg, travel, parking, stationery). Practicum placements may be located throughout Australia or overseas. Students are required to have a current Blue Card (Working with Children Check) before commencing practicum in Queensland. Students can apply for a Blue Card through the School of Education and should do so three months before their practicum is due to commence.

Supplementary information

Fields of study

Guidance and Counselling (St Lucia, *Master only*)

This field provides the knowledge, understanding and skills that are essential for today's professional guidance counsellors. This specially designed program of study allows students to develop competencies as professional guidance counsellors for employment in schools, TAFE colleges, agencies, or as private practitioners. The program focuses on: developing counselling competencies, understanding career development and education across the life-span, linking assessment practices to instructional interventions, understanding ethical behaviour and practices, developing comprehensive guidance programs, and participating in a guidance and counselling practicum placement. This field may only be commenced in semester 1.

Leadership (St Lucia, *Master only*)
Leadership is a critical element of schools and other organisations today, making important contributions to the outcomes, overall success and sustainability of those organisations. This field of study provides students with advanced knowledge and understandings about the leadership and management of educational institutions (including schools, colleges, TAFE institutions), government departments and other organisations. The field of study focuses on the skills, knowledge and attitudes required by leaders in our discontinuously changing world, and challenges students to develop as critically reflective, flexible and ethically collaborative leaders of learning and thinkers. International students may commence in semester 2.

Learning Support (St Lucia, *Master only*)
The field of learning support is designed for people working with students who are at risk of failure. It provides teachers and others interested in promoting student learning with the skills to: identify students who are experiencing difficulties in learning, analyse student learning to identifying the underlying causes of school failure, develop effective programs to enhance student learning of all students, particularly those students who have failed in learning to read, write and do mathematics, work collaboratively with teachers, administrators and other colleagues to develop more effective practices and programs, monitor program effectiveness. International students may commence in semester 2.

Mathematics (St Lucia)

The mathematics field has been designed to meet the increasing professional demands on secondary mathematics teachers. It provides participants with the knowledge and skills needed to engage productively with recent and forthcoming changes to Queensland mathematics syllabuses. The program focuses on strengthening teachers' mathematical content knowledge, and on the practicalities of planning, teaching, and assessment in secondary school mathematics. Participants will also examine current issues in mathematics education and their implications for practice. International students may commence in semester 2.

Middle Years of Schooling (St Lucia, Ipswich)

The middle years of schooling field has been developed in response to a growing need in Australian schools for teachers who have a knowledge of the policies, programs and practices for teaching students in the 'middle years'. Currently, most teachers have trained as

primary or secondary teachers, and therefore often do not have specific knowledge of young adolescents and the implication for curriculum and pedagogy. This field meets this need by providing the specialised knowledge and skills for educators wishing to increase their expertise in teaching young adolescents and become the future leaders of middle years of schooling reform. International students may commence in semester 2.

Science (St Lucia)

This field will attract science teachers who wish to develop their knowledge, skills and strategies in teaching science and will enable them to innovate and provide leadership in science education in the developing area of middle years schooling and also in traditional primary and secondary settings. The extensive use of information and communications technologies will underpin the acquisition of practical skills in the development and implementation of curricula and assessments that reflect the core concepts of science. International students may commence in semester 2.

Career opportunities

Educational studies prepares students for a variety of employment opportunities including learning support teachers, guidance counsellors secondary mathematics teachers, middle years teachers, science teachers and educational administrators. The program also allows students to gain significant professional advantages in advancing their career and broadening their career options.

Students will be exposed to leading thinkers and debates in the public, private and community sectors, and will develop capacities to enhance effectiveness in the workplace and gain a better understanding of the way

governments operate as well as the major public issues confronting our society.

Supplementary information

The Masters of Governance and Public Policy is usually completed in three semesters, however, students have the option of completing the program in one calendar year. The School offers a course, research methods, in intensive mode during winter recess. To complete the program in one year, students must complete #8 units in Semesters 1 and 2, #2 units in the winter recess and #6 units in the summer semester which is a 10-12,000 word research report.

Program outline

This program offers advanced knowledge and skills in human services practice and leadership. Core courses facilitate the development of advanced skills in program and policy design, analysis and evaluation. Students also have the opportunity to undertake in-depth study in key fields of contemporary human services practice including: child protection; family therapy studies; social policy analysis; and management and leadership. These fields of study equip students with advanced knowledge and skills for professional practice in a broad range of human services fields.

Fields of study

Child Protection

The field of child protection has been developed for people seeking to work in child welfare and child protection and for people already working in this field who wish to refresh or upgrade their knowledge and skills. The program provides up to date knowledge of current theoretical and practice approaches in the field. Students will develop necessary skills for effective practice in child welfare and child protection practice. Students who wish to undertake the Graduate Certificate in this field on a full-time basis (including international students) must begin in semester 1.

Community Development

This field focuses on the processes, skills and techniques of community development practice, preparing students for professional practice in local and/or international settings. Courses teach students to critically evaluate and assess community issues; build the capacities of people and institutions; and mobilise and manage resources with the aim of social justice and sustainability. Topics covered include community development analysis and method; community-based training; contemporary and historical practice frameworks; community economics and planning; and local and global issues facing contemporary practice. Students may also have the opportunity to gain local and/or international field exposure but must apply to the School of Social Work and Applied Human Sciences to participate.

Family Therapy Studies

Students study and practice advanced-level family therapy and develop clear conceptual frameworks for practice. Courses enable students to develop practical skills and confidence in family therapy, and a deeper understanding of the history of family therapy (the evolution of family therapy is seen as a central foundation to the development of knowledge and skills). Students also explore the derivation and perspectives of the central schools of family therapy; and integrate contemporary knowledge and skills with personal and professional values and ethics. The teaching approach honours the traditions of family therapy, emphasising the development and integration of theory, practical skills, ethical considerations and practice confidence.

Management and Leadership

This field of study provides students with knowledge and skills for advanced analysis and response to management and leadership issues in human services agencies. Courses offer students with the opportunity to critically analyse ethical and practice challenges facing human services managers and leaders and to develop skills in designing, implementing and evaluating management and leadership responses to these issues. Students have the opportunity to develop skills in technical tasks, such as program management and service evaluation, and in providing effective leadership in an uncertain environment. Graduates possess professional confidence in enabling constructive responses to the contemporary management and leadership demands.

Social Policy Analysis

This field of study provides a solid grounding in social policy analysis which can be adapted and applied in many fields of human service provision and practice. Students build an understanding of contemporary social policy, economic policy and traditional fields of social policy; and of theoretical frameworks from a variety of disciplines. The program critically analyses social policy practice frameworks and theories of social policy development, implementation, delivery and evaluation. Graduates have the skills to participate

effectively in social policy processes; understand the direction of social policy; possess a range of techniques including social needs assessment, cost-benefit analysis and impact assessment; and can respond to new challenges.

Career opportunities

Human services provides you with career opportunities in the public, not for profit, and private sectors of the human services. The latter embraces education, health and housing as well as community care. It is well suited to practitioners moving into more managerial and policy oriented roles in these fields.

Program outline

International Relations (IR) is one of the most exciting components of political science. Increasingly, professional opportunities are linked to, and pursued within, a shrinking and more complex world. Traditionally, dimensions of IR remain central to international peace and prosperity. These include: international diplomacy, arms control, alliance politics, institutionalism and development studies at both the regional and global levels. Newer dimensions of IR however are also moving toward centre-stage, becoming integral components of the field. These include international political

economics, environmental politics, refugee and migration problems, human rights and human security. The rapidly expanding and diverse array of issue-areas that can be studied under the IR rubric establishes the field as a dynamic and important part of our daily lives. The School of Political Science and International Studies at The University of Queensland has strong and growing research and teaching profile in the field of International Relations. It has close ties with several Commonwealth government agencies (including the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade and the Department of Defence) as well as with a number of overseas institutions and research centres in Asia, Europe and North America.

Supplementary information

The Masters of International Studies is usually completed in three semesters, however, students have the option of completing the program in one calendar year. The School offers a course, research methods, in intensive mode during winter recess. To complete the program in one year students must complete #8 units in Semesters 1 and 2, #2 units in the winter recess and #6 units in the summer semester which is a 10-12,000 word research report.

Fields of study

International Relations

International relations is one of the most exciting components of political science. Professional opportunities are increasingly linked to and pursued within a more complex world. Traditional dimensions of IR central to international peace and prosperity include international diplomacy; arms control; alliance politics; institutionalism; and development studies at both the regional and global levels. Students also cover newer components integral in IR including international political economics; environmental politics; refugee and migration problems; human rights; and human security. The expanding array of areas that can be studied under the IR rubric establishes the field as a dynamic and important part of our daily lives.

Peace and Conflict Resolution

Recent international crises, including those emerging in the Asia-Pacific region, highlight the need for greater understanding of the political, economic and social factors that affect security and stability, as well as the tragic human costs involved in such conflicts. The renewed threat of insurgency and terrorism, humanitarian crises in Afghanistan, central Africa and the Balkans, and the dangers of nuclear exchange in south Asia all indicate the need for more effective strategies for promoting peace and stability. Training for mediation and peaceful solutions to conflicts or potential conflicts in our world is an investment in the future: stable, peaceful and prosperous nations will have a positive effect on global security relations. Our programs equip students with the knowledge and practical skills to engage in conflict resolution, peacekeeping and peace-building in the contemporary global context.

Program outline

This program entails a substantial empirical research thesis as well as advanced professionally-oriented coursework, with opportunities for specialist concentration in areas such as child and family, health and older adults. The focus is on gaining a foundation in the scientific bases and practice of clinical

psychology. The training in clinical practice employs evidence-based best practice models in health and mental health settings.

Placement courses

Students are required to complete 1500 hours of supervised practice over six semesters. Every effort is made to place students within a reasonable distance of the UQ campus but they can be expected to travel up to 60 minutes away. Students are generally placed at Ipswich, Brisbane, and the Southeast corner of Queensland. Fields of study

Criminology

In this field, the program draws from a number of disciplines to provide students with the opportunity to develop an understanding of the extent of crime and how criminal justice agencies respond to crime, as well as knowledge of contemporary issues in policy decision-making on crime and its control.

Health Practice

Professionals working in health care as service providers, health care researchers and planners need an understanding of a range of disciplines and a willingness to work in the community, with families and with health care and related institutions. This field comprises an interdisciplinary approach to community health services. It is unique in providing core courses from health psychology, sociology, economics and public health. It equips graduates for work as health care service providers, planners and as health care researchers.

Social Planning

In this field students are expected to gain skills and knowledge expected from a professional social planner for constructing a social plan to guide resource allocation and service/facility planning; ensuring that social needs, along with economic and environmental concerns are carefully considered when decisions are made for development; and inclusive measures developed for maintaining social justice and harmony. Students will learn social planning concepts and theories, techniques in assessing social needs, social impacts, monitoring and evaluating social programs and development projects.

Admission requirements A professional qualification in social work or a degree in a related field and a minimum of 3 years work experience in social and community services practice.

Program outline

The Master of Social Work provides social work practitioners with the opportunity to develop advanced knowledge and skills for professional practice in core social work fields and methods. It allows students the opportunity for in-depth study in fields of interpersonal helping, child and family practice, community practice, and leadership and organisational practice. The courses offer a theoretical and practice base for advanced professional practice and leadership in social work services.

Placement courses

Students are required to complete 250 hours of supervised placement in the #32 unit program (optional for students in the #24 unit program). The field education unit will coordinate placements for students who are required to complete 250 hours of supervised placement. Students are generally placed in proximity to the University due to course attendance requirements; however rural, interstate and international placements can be organised. Every effort is made to place students within a reasonable distance of their home base. In some cases placement locations will incur travel time of up to 90 minutes due to public transport connections. Travel costs will be incurred by students during this time which could result in possible lost income. Students are required to have a current Blue Card (Working with Children Check) before commencing the placement. Students can apply for a Blue Card through The Field Placement office in the School of Social Work and Applied Human

Sciences. All students attending placement will be provided with a Field Placement handbook prior to the commencement of their placement.

Fields of study

Child and Family Practice

Students will gain advanced knowledge and skills in social work practice with children and families. Courses offered in child protection and family therapy practices will build students' appreciation of the diverse contexts of child and family intervention and will equip them for advanced professional practice in child protection and therapeutic service interventions. Students will have options to study advanced assessment and intervention frameworks in both protective and therapeutic interventions.

Community Practice

Students will gain advanced knowledge and skills in advanced community practice in professional social work service contexts. Courses offered will develop students' capacity to design, implement, and evaluate community practice interventions in a range of social work practice fields and in local and/or international development settings.

Interpersonal Practice

Students will gain advanced knowledge and skills in interpersonal practice in social work. Courses offered in counselling, group work, mental health and health practice will build students' appreciation of the diverse contexts and practices of interpersonal helping. Graduates will develop skills in engaging and working with service users from a diversity of backgrounds and with a diversity of concerns.

Leadership and Management Practice

Students will gain advanced knowledge and skills in the leadership and management of social work services. Courses offered develop students' abilities to critically analyse organisational contexts and to design and implement ethical and effective management and leadership responses in social work services. Students will develop the analytical, reflective, interpersonal and practical skills required for personal practice excellence and to mentor, support and develop fellow workers. Students will have the opportunity to develop advanced technical skills in the management of social work services. Topics covered include: leadership in the human services; ethical issues in human services leadership; and program management.

Career opportunities

Graduates have the opportunity to develop practice, research, leadership and management skills that will make them more competitive in areas of advanced practice and management roles. Graduates are employed in a wide range of government and non government organisations as direct practitioners, managers, researchers and policy practitioners. Some graduates use this qualification as a basis for entering private practice.

Coursework Master

Duration 2 years full-time

Admission requirements Honours I or II degree in psychology (or combined human movement studies/psychology) or an undergraduate psychology degree approved by the Australian Psychological Society. Before applying, students with non-Australian degrees must apply to the Australian Psychological Society (<http://www.psychology.org.au/>) for assessment of their qualifications. On acceptance of an offer students must take out probationary registration with the Psychologists Board of Queensland (<http://www.psychologyboard.qld.gov.au/>). This registration must be maintained for the duration of the program. Probationary or full registration is a prerequisite for entry to the degree, and also commencement of both coursework and applied work in the program. All applicants are required to submit a certified copy of their official transcript and/or degree certificate, three referee reports (<http://www.psy.uq.edu.au>) and complete the application form (<http://www.psy.uq.edu.au>) that seeks to ascertain students' suitability for the program. Shortlisted students are also required to undertake an in-depth interview with staff from the School of Psychology. There is a quota of five (5) students for this program. Offers will be made to applicants on the basis of highest academic rank, referees reports and interview.

Program outline

This program prepares students for research and practice in sport and exercise psychology through a combination of coursework, supervised practice, and research experience. Graduates are eligible for registration as psychologists in Queensland and for associate membership in the College of Sports Psychologists.

Placement courses

Students are required to complete 1000 hours of supervised practice over four semesters. Every effort is made to place students within a reasonable distance of the UQ campus but they can be expected to travel up to 60 minutes away. Students are generally placed at Ipswich, Brisbane, and the Southeast corner of Queensland. Students are required to have a current Blue Card (Working with Children Check) before starting their practice. One or two students per year may have the opportunity to have a placement at the Australian Institute of Sport in their final semester.

Career opportunities

Although there are limited advertised full-time positions in sport psychology in Australia each year, the demand for sport psychology services has been steadily increasing. Exercise psychology is becoming relevant to hospitals, gymnasias and health insurance companies. Generally individuals need to go into private practice to tap this demand. Graduates have also gained employment applying performance enhancement techniques to the corporate world. Many have also found employment in other areas of psychology, some as a result of the required external placement in a second area of psychology.

Professional memberships

Graduates of this degree may be eligible for membership with the Australian Psychological Society, APS College of Sport Psychologists (associate membership), and have full state registration as a psychologist.
